

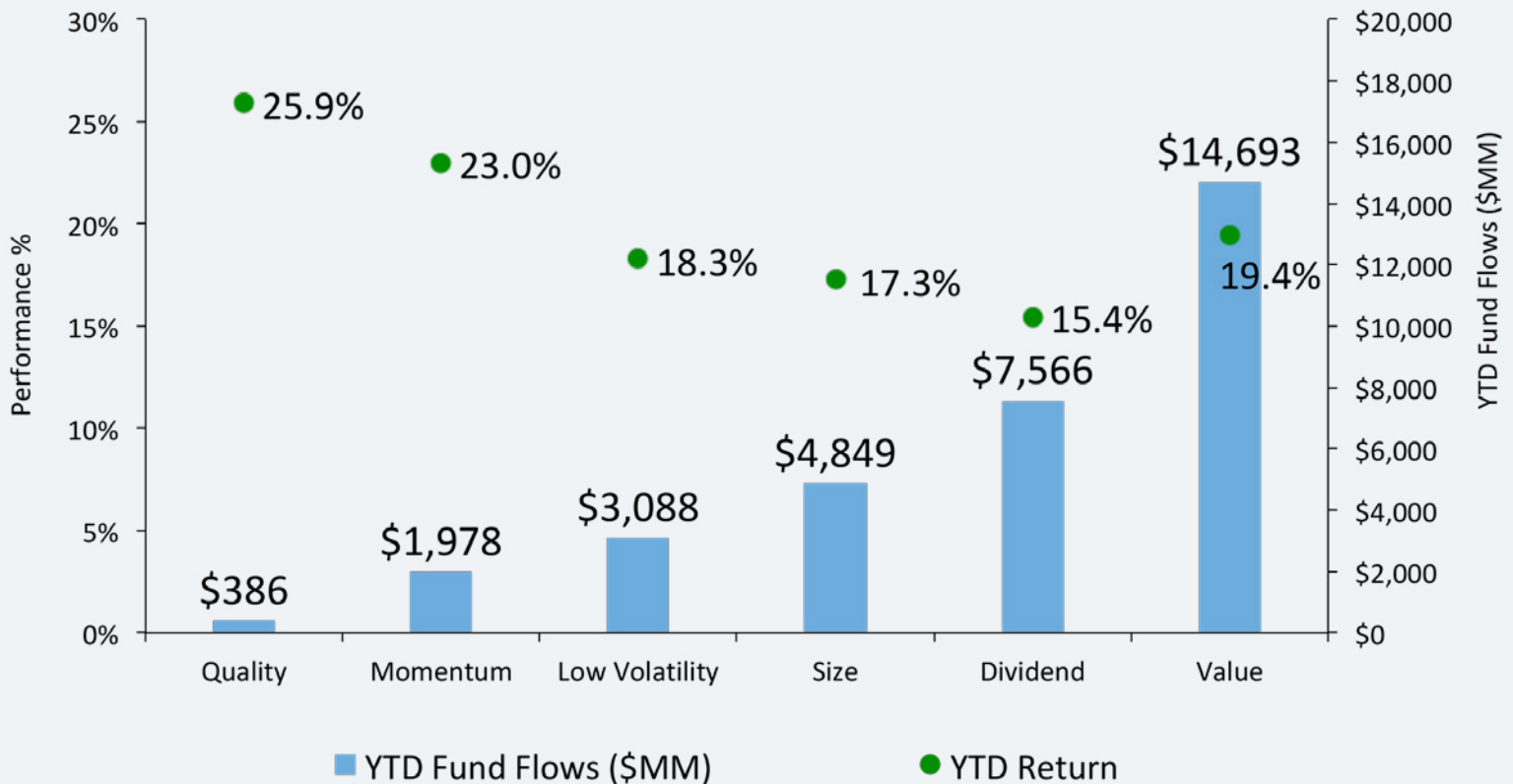
Rotation to Quality Stocks for 2018?

Quality stocks have quietly outperformed the other factors. Quality ETFs however, have taken in the least fund flows year to date. Is 2018 the year that investors rotate into quality stocks?

Quality as a factor, has returned 25.9% compared to 20.5% for the S&P 500. Quality ETFs had fund flows close to \$400 million year to date but trailed all other factors .

ETF Flows Versus Performance

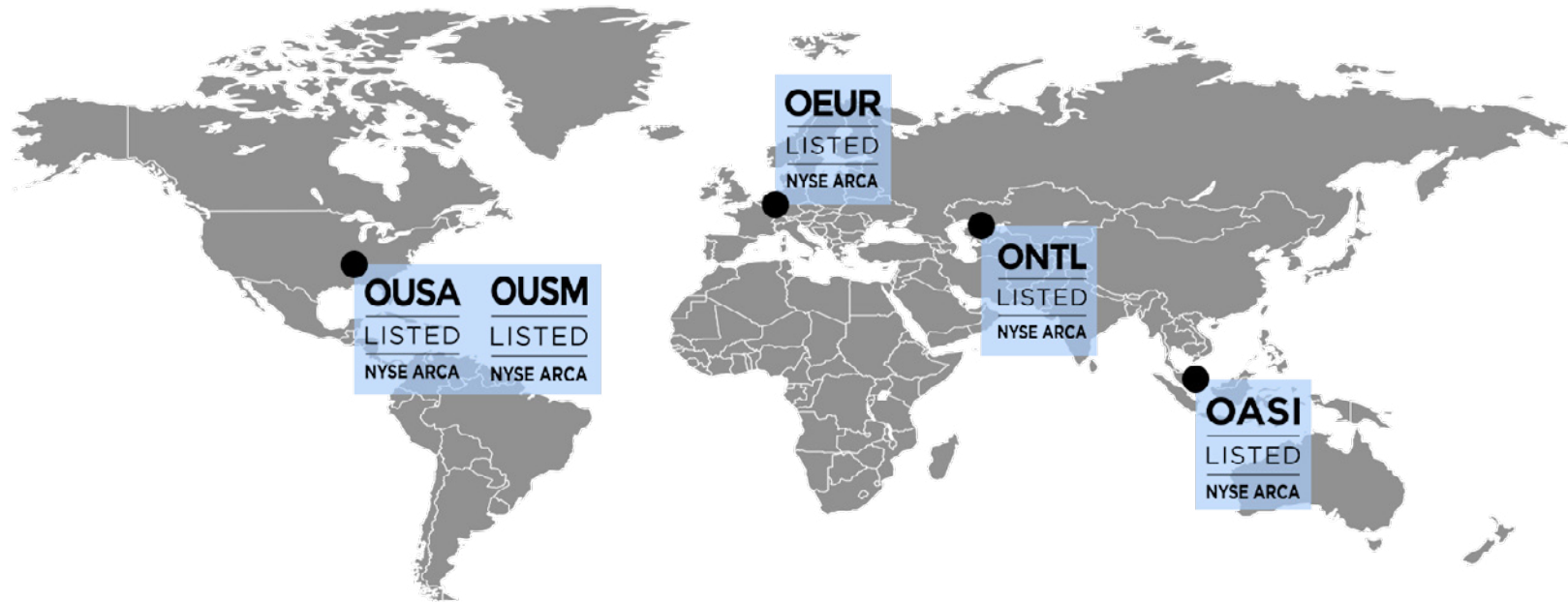
